

Our Feature Article this month, is about our personal deleavening at this season.



is doing in our lives--cleansing and purifying

There are times in our lives when all is well and our faith is strong. Our relationship with Yeshua is good and strong. It is bright and sparkling.

Then there are the times when dust, dirt and cobwebs have accumulated in our hearts and minds; a little bitterness tucked in one corner, judgmentalism tucked behind or hidden with maybe a little pride and rebellion. Stress in our lives may hinder our relationship with Yeshua as well as the people He has put around us.

Part of maturing is to recognize when we have hidden leaven in our hearts and minds. Just as we do with physical leaven, it is necessary to purposefully look for the sin in our lives. If we do not get on our knees and admit we have sin, we may never find it. Our sin will affect those around us without our even being aware of it. Relationships become more strained.

Someone who is immature will blame others for the problems, not understanding that the sin hidden in their hearts is the problem. In this way, they rationalize they don't have to deal with the sin in **their** life. "I'm the one being wronged." "You make me angry." "If you wouldn't (or would) do it this (my) way, there would be no problem." They may not use those exact words, but that is what they mean.

As we've learned in *Life Model*, this immaturity is often a reflection of a lack of nurturing in their childhood. As adults, though, it is time to take responsibility for their own actions and sin.

A mature adult will admit, "Yes, I'm wrong, I have sinned." There are times in my own life when Psalm 51 becomes a daily prayer for me to pray YHWH will search out the sin in my life and show me where I need to repent. It is usually a difficult process, but in the end, freedom comes.

Lashon Hara: When to Respond and When to Leave it in His Hands



A recent conversation brought out a concern as to what the Godly response needs to be when *lashon hara* surfaces. As you know, one aspect of *lashon hara* involves gossip and bad reports of others. It can also involve speaking derogatorily of one's self. Some people fear that providing a warning about unscrupulous behavior is *lashon hara*. It is really quite an extensive subject and is thoroughly discussed in the Hebrew

Roots publication on the subject; *Guarding the Tongue*.

We generally think about the individual responsibility to guard ourselves against falling into this sin, but there is also the aspect of what to do, if anything, when awareness of such behavior of others surfaces. This is an ongoing problem for individuals but it is also a very common and distressing problem for those in leadership positions.

It is such an easy snare to fall into making observations and conclusions about actions taken by leaders, even when the full circumstances are not known.

It may even involve a genuine desire to participate in resolution, though not necessarily in the most productive way.

Just One Proper Response?

I submit that there is not a "one size fits all" response but that there are factors to consider in discernment about a response. The quality, type and intensity of the problem relationships of those involved will affect the choice of an appropriate response.

Then there are the times when we know the is there and don't want to look at it. In my experience, Yeshua will continue to point it out until I come in humble submission before Him and confess my sin.

In our [May 2006 newsletter](#), I wrote about what the *Life Model* calls the *sark*. It is that part of us that struggles to understand what is **Truth** and what is **False**. **It is the daily bat with our flesh**. Ever since Adam and Chavah of the Fruit of the Tree of the Knowledge of God and Evil, we have had this battle.

According to the *Life Model*, *The sark is the seat of false discernment, false guidance and false knowledge of good and evil*. The *sark*, or the flesh, does not have righteous understanding and will usually be wrong until bring it under submission to Yeshua. We were not intended to determine between good and evil. At times, we **think** we are doing what's best in a situation and it turns out to be wrong.

The *sark* can also cause us to accumulate leaven in our lives, making excuses for our behavior and not being responsible to anyone, including YHWH. This is immature and ungodly. It is difficult to look inside and see what needs to be cleansed out. It is hard work, just as it is to de-leaven our homes.

Our S.A.M. community has come to understand the importance of this cleansing process in our lives. We take very seriously the process of de-leavening ourselves before Pesach. It has become a regular practice for us to take time for a *mikveh* to declare our intent to be undefiled before YHWH.

In Jewish tradition, the head of the household goes around looking to make sure every bit of leaven has been removed. This year, will you allow your Heavenly Abba to search inside you to make sure every bit of leaven has been removed?

Our Elohim is Himself, relational. It is impossible to imagine following our Echad Creator without an awareness of the need for relationship; with Him and among ourselves. As Yeshua prayed that we may be one as He and the Father are One, so do we believe that our goal is to move toward that unity with one another, maturing toward becoming like Him; and that this is a central aspect of the kingdom "work" we are called to do.

When relationship problems such as false reports or accusations arise we find that if we try to apply the same response across the board of all types of relationships, we will find ourselves stymied too often, and may contribute to further harm; equally through action and inaction.

Distant Acquaintance vs Intimate Ally

We find that it is important to consider the "nearness or distance" of the relationship as well as the roles and maturity levels of those involved. If we consider our relationships on a concentric circle, we would put those with whom we have just a distant, nodding relationship on the outer ring. An example might be someone we know by reputation or by their writing only. It could also refer to the cashier at the grocery store whom we know by sight and frequent contact but nothing more personal than that. As the quality of the relationship and the amount of mutual information shared grows, an individual moves from the most outer ring toward the center; from acquaintances on the larger rings, toward mutual friendships, closer relationships with family and friends, down to the smaller rings which include fewer people at each level, perhaps ending in the intimacy of a spouse or a friend "who sticks closer than a brother." By the very nature of these close relationships it becomes apparent that there is a limit to the number of intimate relationships that any one person can sustain, just as the size of the circle diminishes toward the center.

Role and Relationship Qualities

As for roles and maturity levels, with those we know, it is necessary to consider whether the lashon hara is coming from someone who is at more of a child or adolescent stage toward another in the same category, or perhaps toward a parent or elder. It is especially distressing to us when we learn of one who had appeared to be in that parent or elder stage of maturity spreading lashon hara. As a parent is more tolerant toward a child, and considers miss steps as an opportunity for discipline and teaching, so do we as parents or elders in fellowships need to do with other members who have not yet fully matured. But when such destructive behavior comes from one who has the appearance of maturity it seems there is a great necessity to prayerfully investigate and consider what has been hiding under the surface.

Keeping Your Joy Full!



Just how the Word was first proclaimed the Bible does not say, but it does say that "the morning stars sang together, and all the sons of God shouted for joy." From that verse in the book of Job we can gather that there was some shouting going on somewhere. It charms the mind to think that God Himself, the Great Ruler of heaven, could have suddenly started the creation not with a Big Bang so much as a Big Shout! That is to say, God spoke in His holiness and the universe began, and was, and is.

A strange expression is found in Psalm 47, which describes a magnificent Israelite victory that was being celebrated with great jubilation. It seems people were clapping their hands and exalting the Lord Most High. Then in verse 5 we hear the psalmist saying, "God has gone up with a shout, the LORD with the sound of a trumpet." How amazing! Imagine God shouting for joy! Yet there it is, in the divine record. ...

Joy, I was told, is not an isolated or occasional consequence of faith, it is an integral part of our whole relation to God. The joy of the Lord is something that rises above circumstances and focuses on the very character of God. I learned that there is a holy joy, so pure it exists even in the midst of sorrow. I also learned that joy comes to us from the Holy Spirit along with love, peace, and other virtues described by Paul in his letter to the Galatians.
